

There are 21 America's Job Centers of California (AJCC) across LA County, funded by federal, state, and local dollars, the centers provide a breadth of resources to their customers. Whether residents are searching for long-term employment or businesses are seeking employees or resources to succeed, each AJCC is embedded in its community, partnering with a number of public, private, and non-profit entities to ensure all customers can receive comprehensive, wraparound services.

Career Coaching

AJCC career coaches help residents navigate the job search process, providing support and resources along the way.

Job Training

Those who qualify can obtain financial assistance with job training opportunities -- in the classroom, online, and even on the job!

Supportive Services

Individuals who need assistance with costs related to housing, transportation, and utilities, among others, might qualify for help.

Partner Resources

Every AJCC has a vast network of local partners to provide wraparound assistance to every customer.

Adults

AJCCs offer programs for all LA County residents, giving priority of service to low-income individuals, public assistance recipients, and others facing barriers to employment and helping anyone looking to change careers.

Dislocated Workers

Workers who have been laid off may qualify for a number of different programs, some of which include placement paid transitional jobs. Many AJCCs are co-located with EDD for assistance with unemployment insurance and other resources.

Justice-Involved Individuals

The AJCC system has different programs designed for individuals involved with the justice system, all of which have re-entry specific resources and case management services that are conscious of the barriers specific to this population.

Persons Experiencing Homelessness

For individuals experiencing homelessness, AJCCs work closely with a network of social enterprises to provide this population with housing-related resources. Some programs include a temporary job component, in which the participants can work while gaining experience and earning a paycheck.



Aging Adults (55+)

Aging adults qualify for different services, including the Title V Senior Community Service Employment Program (SCSEP), a part-time, subsidized employment program in which the participants are placed onsite at public and community-based organizations. While working, they receive soft skills assistance and support with their job search.

Youth@Work (14-24)

For LA County residents ages 14-24, the Youth@Work program offers paid work experience at businesses all over the County. Additionally, many of the youth complete a soft skills component in which they are exposed to different careers, engage with financial literacy concepts, and grow themselves personally and professionally.

Veterans

In partnership with the Department of Military and Veterans Affairs, WDACS has established a Veterans AJCC. This AJCC was created to focus on the needs of this population, connecting them with employment opportunities and community resources specifically for veterans.

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
